Currently there are sixteen (16) schools in Constellation's community of schools; they are: Old Brooklyn Community Elementary, Old Brooklyn Community Middle, Parma Community Elementary, Middle and High, Elyria Community Elementary, Lorain Community Elementary, Lorain Community Middle, Westpark Community Elementary, Westpark Community Middle, Mansfield Community Elementary, Puritas Community Elementary, Puritas Community Middle, Stockyard Community Elementary, Madison Community Elementary, Lorain Gifted Academy, Outreach Academy for Children with Disabilities and Westside Community School of the Arts.

Our learning communities are characterized by small classes, high expectations, involved parents, and engaged students. We provide safe and secure buildings; the best available curriculum; current textbooks; and, extensive use of computers and other technology. Message from the Chairman

Constellation Schools continues to grow and improve. During the 2006/2007 school year we have implemented many things designed to ensure our schools have the resources necessary to assist students, and that our teachers know how to use these resources.



Every teacher in every classroom is using AIMSweb to assess student performance on an ongoing basis. Where students are not advancing as expected, interventions can be implemented nearly immediately. Professional development for teachers and staff has always been a high priority for us, however, this year we greatly expanded and improved our professional development program. Our special education program remains second to none, and this year we have expanded our use of alternative assessments to ensure the success of all children. We have also focused on standardizing our curriculum, our summer school program, and our kindergarten readiness screening. Because of the growth we have experienced, and our expected future growth, we implemented a Principal Training Program. Two interns spent the entire year working with our experienced principals and administrators to ensure they will be ready to open and effectively operate Constellation schools for the 2007/2008 school year.

Despite our growth, student and school performance continue to improve. For the 2005/2006 school year, Westpark Community Elementary and Lorain Gifted Academy were rated "Excellent," and Old Brooklyn Community Elementary and Parma Community Elementary, Middle & High were rated "Effective" by the Ohio Department of Education. Most other Constellation schools are rated "Continuous Improvement" but all are focused on improving student performance.



Our expansion plans for Old Brooklyn Community Elementary/Old Brooklyn Community Middle, Westpark Community Elementary/Westpark Community Middle, Lorain Community Elementary/Lorain Community Middle, Stockyard Community Elementary and Parma Community Elementary, Middle & High continue with groundbreaking expected at Old Brooklyn and Westpark during the 2007/2008 school year. To accommodate the expansion we are currently seeking a \$20 million bond issue and expect to have the transaction finalized by fall. Our purchase of the Schaaf Community Center building in Parma will also allow us to initiate our first high school during the 2007/2008 school year.

Our specialty schools, Lorain Gifted Academy and Outreach Academy, continue to meet the needs of underserved populations. Gifted students at our Lorain Academy are flourishing with the rigorous program we have established. And, the profoundly disabled/medically fragile children served by Outreach Academy also flourish with the compassionate program we have created there.

Besides initiating our first-ever high school program, we will also open a school dedicated to bringing a high quality arts program to Cleveland's west side during the 2007/2008 school year.

Strategic planning continues to play a major role in the development of our organization and our schools, and our focus remains on one thing – providing a high quality education to all children.

During the 2006-2007 school year Puritas Community Elementary served 178 students in grades K-4. Students at Puritas Community Elementary are taken on a first come, first served basis during the first two weeks of December. Those students who are currently enrolled are ensured a place for the following school year if they enroll during these two weeks. If more students apply than there are spots, a lottery is held and a waiting list is formed.

How do you achieve such an impressive average attendance rate? Create an environment where children want to come to school. Our teachers are tireless in their efforts to create exciting and meaningful daily lessons for our students. By using a variety of teaching tools and techniques, these "Highly Qualified" professionals establish a setting for the enjoyment of learning. In addition to the wonderful things taking place within the walls of the school, our student enjoy field trips to Cleveland's Playhouse Square to view entertaining children's theater, the Rainforest and Zoo, Education Days at an Akron Aeros Baseball game, the History Museum, and, even a trip to a local restaurant to see how spaghetti is made. 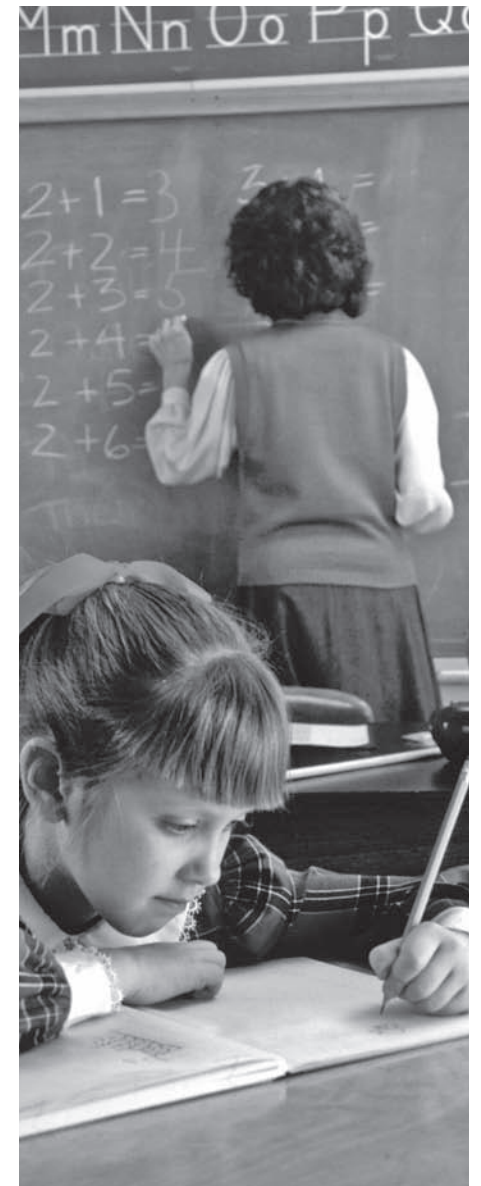

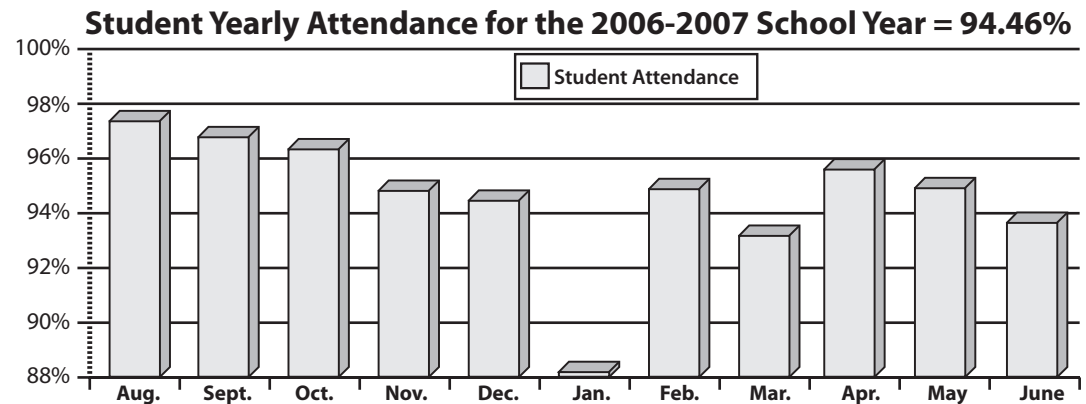
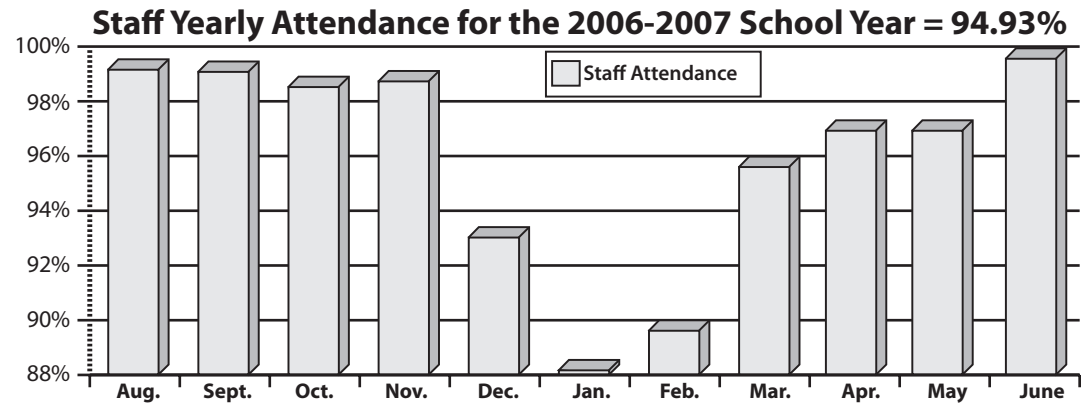

Home School Notification

The school is a public school and students enrolled in and attending the school are required to take proficiency tests and other examinations prescribed by law. In addition, there may be other requirements for students at the school that are prescribed by law. Students who have been excused from the compulsory attendance law for the purpose of home education as defined by the Administrative code shall no longer be excused for that purpose upon their enrollment in a community school.





Education Plans/Programs

- To provide an atmosphere of caring and concern for the well being of each student
- To assist children with learning difficulties by offering individual attention
- To limit class sizes to twenty students maintaining a workable student/teacher ratio
- To provide a sense of growth through special activities, such as, the 100th Day of School Celebration, Puritas Pals Day, music programs, book fairs, and much more
- To offer areas of enrichment through field trips and assemblies

To ensure its students are prepared for the state mandated Proficiency Tests, Puritas Community Elementary (PTCE) chose the Ohio Academic Content Standards Educational Program as the basis for its Curriculum. The PTCE program includes language arts, social studies, citizenship, sciences, mathematics, art, music and physical education. Saxon Phonics, along with the adoption of the Harcourt Trophies Series, helps to increase students' success in early literacy.

Art is integrated throughout the curriculum through a variety of opportunities to explore different materials and tools. Children are invited to enjoy art as a process rather than a means to a finished product. Drawing, painting, printing, collage, chalking and stenciling are only a few of the art activities students enjoy at PTCE.

The children participate in a variety of field trips to further enhance the curriculum. This year, field trips to Playhouse Square, the Zoo and Rainforest, and a trip to Educational Days at an Akron Aeros Baseball game for our fourth and fifth graders, are just a few of the fun things our students enjoyed.

Community Involvement:

The students enjoyed many opportunities to reach out to members of our immediate community, and to express their patriotism to those individuals' great distances from our community. The children made ornaments for a nearby nursing home, and brought them to the residents. Also, the students, once again, took part in a ceremony at NASA honoring those who lost their lives serving our country, and those still Missing in Action.

A wonderful example of community involvement for our students is our own parent organization, the Puritas A+. With over 2000 volunteer hours logged by this tireless organization, the students, and the school, are truly winners.

Parent Involvement:

There is no denying the importance of a strong Parent Organization to the success of a school, and, there is no denying the impressive strength of the Puritas A+, "Active Parents Lending Us Support", our superb parent organization. Collectively, they log over 2000 hours of volunteer time for the benefit of the Puritas children. 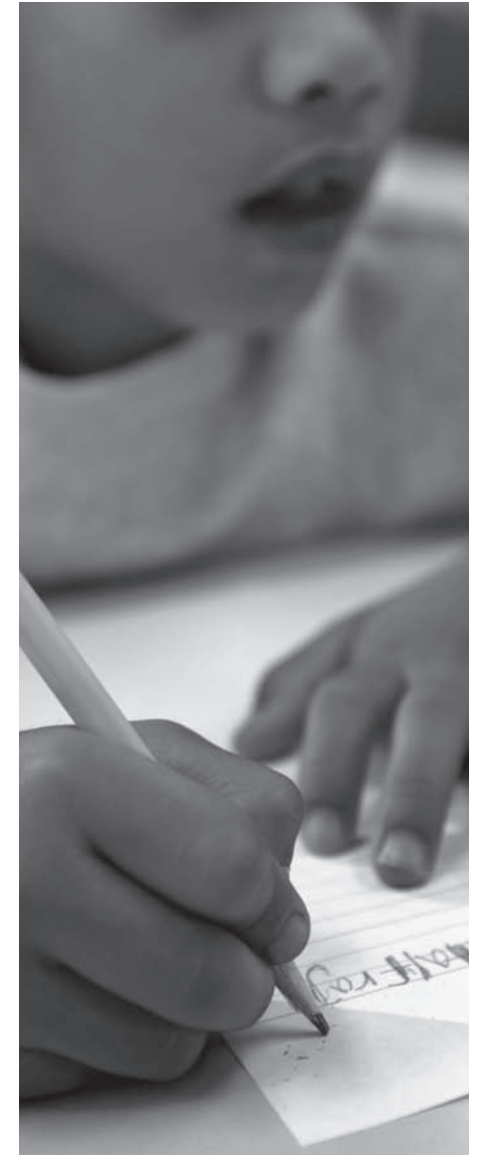

FINANCIAL REPORT for FISCAL YEAR 2007

Highlights for the Year

- 3rd annual audit by the Auditor of State issued for 2006 with an "unqualified opinion" (best opinion available)
- Continued enrollment growth and expansion into additional classrooms.
- The Middle School was made a separate school during the fall of 2007

The Cash Basis Report of Revenues and Expenditures for the Year ended June 30, 2007 reflects the activities of Puritas Community Elementary during the year. The information provided below refers to this report and the accompanying graphs.

Revenues

The largest source of operating revenue (84%) comes from the State of Ohio School Foundation Program. This funding is earned at a base rate of \$5,403 for each student enrolled during the year. Additional funds are provided for the special needs of students, the poverty level of the community in which each student resides, and other adjustments.

State and Federal Grants (11%) supplement school operations for specific purposes. Puritas Community Elementary received grants for Title I Reading, Professional Development, Technology, Safe and Drug Free Schools, Innovative Programs, Special Education, Child Nutrition Services, Entry Year Teacher Mentoring, Statistical Reporting (EMIS) and Electronic Communications.

Materials Fees (3%) are collected from each student to provide consumable materials used during the year.

Other income (2%) includes interest earned on bank account activity, food services and other miscellaneous items.

Expenditures

Personnel services, combined with retirement and benefits, accounted for 48% of the expenditures for the year. These expenditures include principal, support staff, teachers, state retirement systems, employment taxes and health insurances.

Purchased services (37%) include expenditures for specialty teachers (music, Spanish and physical education), student support services (speech, psychologist, health, physical therapy and occupational therapy), field trips, professional development, management services, test scoring, facility operations, equipment leases, telephone, postage, travel, marketing, printing and food services.

Supplies and materials (9%) include textbooks, instructional supplies, testing materials, office supplies, medical supplies, instructional software and maintenance supplies.

Capital Outlay (5%) includes purchases of equipment, furniture and building renovations.

Other (1%) includes audit fees, insurances (property, liability, fidelity bond, director/officer), dues and subscriptions and miscellaneous.
